# **Get Involved in Budget Season!**

Dear Rush-Henrietta Residents,

Budget season is in full swing and we want to make sure our community is informed before this year's vote Tuesday, May 20. I invite you to become more involved and learn about the budget process and eventual budget proposal in the weeks and months ahead.

The district's first budget proposal last spring fell short of approval by just 15 votes. Low turnout and misinformation were key factors in this unexpected outcome. That experience was difficult for our community. With that in mind, we are providing additional opportunities to learn more about the budget-development process and proposed 2025-2026 budget.

In October, I invited community members to attend two informational meetings about different aspects of the budget-development process. We also talked about the state rules school districts must follow when creating a spending plan. The district recorded one of these sessions and I encourage you to watch it at your earliest convenience. The video is available at rhnet.org/budgetinfo.

Our outreach efforts will continue in earnest. Soon, we will have new opportunities for you to learn more about the budget proposal being developed now. This work is being done with the input of stakeholders who serve as members of the Rush-Henrietta Budget Advisory Council. The council provides a way for stakeholders and myself to share the ideas and understandings necessary for the successful development of a budget that best represents community values. Please note the opportunities listed on the right side of the page.

# **R-H Helping to Develop New Teachers**

Katrina Grantham didn't always want to be a teacher. After graduating from SUNY Brockport with a degree in math, she worked for several years as an actuary specializing in retirement benefits. When the pandemic kept her home helping her kindergartner navigate his schoolwork, she realized she found her calling. "I started helping teach a few other kids in the neighborhood, too," she says. "We called it the Grantham Institute and I absolutely loved it."

Grantham is pursuing a master's in education through the University of Rochester's Warner School of Education. As a fellow in the Monroe County Teacher Residency Consortium, she is partnering with a local school district as part of a fullacademic-year residency program. An R-H grad who attended Sherman Elementary School, Grantham is excited to be in a familiar location at Sherman for her residency. She is placed in a class for the year, working with the co-teachers on lesson planning, leading lessons, and providing extra support for students. One day each week she serves as a substitute teacher in the building, giving her a variety of important hands-on experiences.

"I appreciate all the opportunities the teachers I work with have given me," Grantham says. "I am encouraged by the way this school community has been intentionally built to be inclusive for all students. This residency allows me to see the value in what I am learning and how it is put into practice in a classroom."

Her co-teachers, Emily Van Scooter and Kim Bolzner, make sure she is involved in all aspects of leading a classroom - from working with the students to meeting with families. "Having her in the classroom allows us greater flexibility to meet individual student needs. She also brings such great enthusiasm to her work - she has energized us," Van Scooter shares.

Rush-Henrietta is proud to participate in professional opportunities such as this, especially when they support our strategic plan's goal of Excellence for Every Student. # UPK Program Moving to Fyle, Winslow

Rush-Henrietta plans to relocate its Universal Pre-K program from Good Shepherd to two elementary schools effective September 2025. The Board of Education endorsed this change after much thoughtful consideration. This idea has been in the public arena for five years and plans were ramped up in earnest for the past year.

Good Shepherd has four UPK classrooms. Fyle and Winslow each will welcome two classrooms to their buildings in the fall. Principals look forward to greeting their new students! Both of these buildings have space to properly accommodate additional children. There are numerous benefits to moving the UPK program to these K-3 schools. Students in the UPK program at Fyle and Winslow will:

- have access to a school nurse.
- receive free breakfast and lunch.
- use bathrooms located within the classroom.
- be able to participate in specials such as P.E. and music.
- be better prepared to make the transition to kindergarten.



Teachers, parents, and administrators have met to discuss how to help ensure a successful transition of the UPK program to Fyle and Winslow. Additionally, internal meetings are being held to think through every aspect of this transition. A ThoughtExchange designed for parents of current and incoming UPK students was conducted in January to seek feedback and address concerns.

The district will consider relocating other programs housed at Good Shepherd in the future, as well. While the building has served Rush-Henrietta well for many years, it will cost millions of dollars to renovate the aging building to make it as safe and modern as our community deserves. We do not believe that pursuing that path is fiscally responsible. Please note that UPK programs housed at local child care centers will continue to operate without change.
