The school district is governed by a seven-member Board of Education elected by eligible voters of the district. Members are volunteer public officials who serve, without pay, for three-year terms. As elected representatives of district residents and as officers of the state of New York, board members must carry out duties required by the state Legislature, the Board of Regents, and the state Commissioner of Education. The board establishes policies for the operation of the district and the superintendent of schools carries out these policies.

Board meeting dates are indicated on the monthly calendar pages and on page 3 or by accessing the online calendar on the district website, www.rhnet.org. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. and are held in the Dee Strickland Conference Room at the Parker Administration Building, 2034 Lehigh Station Road, unless otherwise noted. The board transacts business only at scheduled meetings. Special meetings may

be called at the discretion of the board president. District residents are invited to participate at a designated time in all regular board meetings. All board meeting information is available in BoardDocs, located under the Board of Education tab on the district website, www.rhnet.org.

Voter Information

Budget Vote and Board Election Tuesday, May 19, 2026

Each May, eligible voters have the opportunity to vote on the school budget proposed by the Board of Education. In the weeks before the vote, residents will receive the budget newsletter, providing relevant voting information. Election of members to the Board of Education is held in conjunction with the annual vote on the school district budget. Members are volunteers elected at-large for three-year terms. The annual vote will be held Tuesday, May 19, 2026, at the Transportation and Operations Center, 1133 Lehigh Station Road.

A person shall be entitled to vote in any district election for the selection of members of the Board of Education and in all other matters which may be brought before the voters and placed upon the official ballot, if such person is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age, a resident within the school district for a period of 30 days prior to the election, and qualified to register or is registered to vote in accordance with section 5-106 of the Election Law. You do not have to own property in the district. Challenges to voters believed unqualified to vote may be undertaken pursuant to Education Law provisions and in accordance with regulations accompanying Policy 2120.2. The school district requires all persons voting to provide their name, address, and signature.

Arbiter Sports is a secure registration platform that provides an easy, user-friendly way to register for our sports programs. When you register through Arbiter Sports, the system keeps track of your information in an online profile. You enter information only once for each family member; the information you initially enter is available for use with multiple programs.

Required forms can be uploaded using the online system during the clearance process starting 30 days prior to the start of the season. You will be able to upload current physical forms and medical orders, and complete the sports questionnaire form during this clearance process. Chronic absenteeism is a nationwide problem that worsened after the pandemic. While R-H has made progress in reducing absenteeism, there is still more to be done. We have expanded Social-Emotional Learning efforts and implemented programs to encourage students to feel connected to school.

Challenges with school attendance often are related to anxiety and feeling disconnected. Mental Health & Wellness

Rush-Henrietta continues to prioritize mental health, expanding its partnership with the University of Rochester Medical Center's Pediatric Behavioral Health and Wellness team to provide access and support to even more students and families. Site-based clinics have been added at Burger, Roth, Leary, and Winslow, joining those at Crane, Fyle, Sherman, and Vollmer.

Each clinic offers student outpatient mental health services. Reasons for referral for this support may include identified mental health concerns, difficulty functioning in the classroom, concerns about attendance or academic achievement, challenges with peer or adult relationships, and disciplinary issues. The school-based clinics also provide diagnostic assessment, individual and family therapy, and thoughtful consultation services that help parents, teachers, mental health workers, and administrators to better collaborate.

Rush-Henrietta is committed to prioritizing mental health and supporting our strategic-plan goal to increase social-emotional competency among students. As part of this initiative, we implemented the DESSA universal screener to help us better understand and respond to student needs. We also added staff to help support the mental health needs of our students.

Parent's Right to Know

As a parent of a student in the Rush-Henrietta Central School District, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teacher(s) who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask certain information about your child's classroom teacher(s), and requires us to give you this information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the NYS Education
 Department has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- Whether the NYS Education
 Department has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulation because of special circumstances.
- The teacher's college major and whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degree.
- Whether any paraprofessionals provide service to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.



Parent Notifications



Access to Student Records

The Board of Education recognizes the legal requirements to maintain the confidentiality of student records. To that end, the district notifies students, parents, and guardians of their rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) with an annual notification in school and district publications, in a letter mailed home to parents/guardians in the fall, and in the packet of information given to each parent/ quardian upon registering a child during the school year.

District Policy 5500 (Student Records) and its regulation govern these district practices and clearly outline the rights of parents and students. District policies are available to parents at the office of the district clerk or online at the district website, www. rhnet.org/policies.

Email Communication with Parents

In its effort to facilitate regular communication between parents and schools, the Rush-Henrietta Central School District encourages the use of email by school personnel to contact parents about their students. If you would prefer that teachers or administrators not use email in their communication with you, please contact the main office of your child's school to request a copy of District Exhibit 4714-E.1. This document also may be accessed via the district website, www.rhnet.org/policies, or by going to the Board of Education tab and clicking District Policies. Parents can do a search for Policy 4714 Communication with Parents/Guardians, and then open the policy and print the related file, Communication w/Parents/Guardians Exhibit 4714-E.1 - Parent/Guardian Refusal Letter. Parents should fill out the form and send it to the principal of their child's school.

Directory Information

While most student records and information are not released without parental permission, "directory information," in certain cases, may be. Directory information includes a student's name, parents' name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, e-mail address, photograph, grade, participation in school activities or sports, weight and height if a member of an athletic team, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and most recent previous school attended. It is the practice of the district to release such information to colleges, other post-secondary education institutions, military recruiters, and school-related vendors, e.g., school photographers and yearbook publishers. The release of directory information to the media shall be for the sole purpose of reporting upon or promoting a district activity and shall not include addresses and telephone numbers. If parents do not want the district to release directory information to such groups, they should notify their child's school principal, in writing. A complete explanation of these policies and practices is found in District Policy 5500, its regulation, and exhibits. These are available at the office of the district clerk, or on the district website, www.rhnet.org/policies.

Student Privacy and Parental Rights

The privacy of students and the authority of parents are carefully protected by the district. Parents may inspect, upon request, any instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum for students. Additionally, parental permission will be obtained prior to the administration of any student survey, funded in part or in whole by the U.S. Department of Education, which reveals specific personal information about the child or family. A complete explanation of these rights and protections is found in District Policy 4510 and its regulation. These documents are available to parents at the office of the district clerk or online at the district website, www.rhnet.org/policies.

Student Code of Conduct

The Board of Education is committed to providing a safe, inclusive, equitable, and orderly school environment where students may receive, and district personnel may deliver, quality educational services without disruption. The district is committed to ensuring that each student is safe, engaged, supported, and challenged; helping students develop self-discipline and social and emotional growth; and guiding students in improvement and correction of inappropriate behaviors. Responsible behavior by students, employees, parents/guardians, and visitors is expected, as it is essential to achieving this goal.

The Board recognizes the need to clearly define these expectations for acceptable behavior; identify the appropriate, graduated consequences of unacceptable behavior; and ensure that consequences, when necessary, are administered promptly and fairly. The goal is not to penalize, but to teach students there are reasonable consequences to actions and choices. To this end, the Board adopts a Code of Conduct based upon education laws, regulations, and Board policies. A summary of the Code of Conduct is mailed to homes prior to the start of school. For a complete copy of the Code of Conduct, please go to the district website at www.rhnet.org/codeofconduct.

Attendance and Promotion Policies

Consistent school attendance, academic success, and school completion have a positive correlation, therefore, the Board of Education has established student attendance and promotion guidelines and regulations. District Policy 5100 outlines the attendance policy, which is also explained in the Rush-Henrietta comprehensive attendance policy document. These documents are available on the district website and in the office of student and family services. District Policy 4750 explains processes related to student grade-level promotion and retention. The Board of Education annually reviews and adopts these policies, which are available on the district website, www.rhnet.org/policies.

Emergency Closings

When schools are closed unexpectedly, Rush-Henrietta will attempt to contact the homes of district students using our mass-messaging telephone system. Families also are encouraged to tune to radio and television stations in Rochester. Information regarding closings, delays, or early dismissals also will be posted on the district website, www.rhnet.org. The media is notified about closings by 6 a.m. The Cub Care Program is closed on the days when school is closed due to an emergency. Please do not call the schools or transportation office.

Searches in Schools - Board of Education Policy 5330-R.1 Section 7

The Rush-Henrietta Central School District has reserved control of all student lockers, desks, and other school spaces. Students, accordingly, should have no reasonable expectation of privacy therein as to school officials. Students, parents, and those in parental relationships are advised that such spaces are subject to search by school officials, at any time, without notice.

Committee on Special Education (CSE)

CSE meetings are held throughout the school year when school is in session, with a limited number of meetings held in July and August. Parents are sent confidential notices inviting them to participate as members of their child's CSE meeting. For more information, please call the Office of Special Education at 359-7931.

Herbicide Application Notification

On occasion, the district may need to apply an emergency application of herbicides on school grounds. This is typically done on long weekends when school is not in session. Please go to our website at www.rhnet.org/herbicide for more information and the forms needed to request a 48-hour advance notification.

New Entrants

Parents new to the district should register their children at the district registrar's office as soon as possible. To register, please contact the district registrar at (585) 359-7957. Upon registration, parents will be required to present documentation of district residency, documentation of the child's age, a record of the child's immunizations, a health certificate from a licensed medical professional, and if applicable, a copy of judicial or court-ordered quardianship. Acceptable forms of documentation for residency include mortgage/deed or lease to a house, condominium, or apartment. Acceptable forms of documentation to prove age include a birth certificate or baptismal record. If neither of these is available, other evidence may be considered if it has been in existence for at least two years. The school will make arrangements for the transfer of children's records from their former school after parents sign a release form. School personnel may test children new to the district to determine the best classroom placement and courses for them. For more information and required forms, visit the district website at www.rhnet.org/register.

Kindergarten Registration

Children are eligible to enter kindergarten in September 2026 if they will be 5 years old on or before December 1, 2026. Parents are asked to register their children for 2026-2027 kindergarten classes at the district registration office between January 20 and March 31, 2026.

Early kindergarten registration gives school officials time to plan for the screening and orientation programs for incoming kindergartners and their parents. Notice of Equal Educational and Employment Opportunities

Student Health Notes & Sports



Medicine in School

School personnel are not allowed to give either prescription or non-prescription medication to children in school without written authorization from parents and a physician. If parents wish to have their children receive medicine in school, the following requirements must be met each school year:

- A written order from the primary care physician indicating frequency, dosage, duration, and purpose must be given to the school health office.
- Written permission from the parent to give the medicine as prescribed by the primary care physician must be given to the school health office.
- The medicine must be packaged in the original container from the pharmacy.
- Parents are responsible for delivering the medicine to the school health office. Students may not carry or transport medication to/in school unless specifically authorized to do so.
- Medicines should be halved, as needed, so they are ready for dispensing.

School Physicals

New York state law requires parents or guardians to furnish a certificate of physical examination within 30 days of entrance for all new students, and for students in grades kindergarten, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11, and for those students participating in sports, requiring special education services, or seeking work permits. It is recommended that all examinations be done by your primary care physician for optimal continuity and health care of your child. If you do not have health insurance, or are in need of a physician, confidential assistance is available by contacting your school health office. In rare instances in which a family is unable to obtain private health care, a physical examination may be conducted in the school by the district nurse practitioner.

Dental Health Certificate

We recognize the importance of good oral hygiene for all children and recommend that your child has regular periodic complete dental examinations by a dentist every six months, but at least upon entrance to school and again in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11. A dental health certificate is encouraged to be furnished for your child for inclusion in your child's record. Please submit a completed dental certificate to your school health office. Forms are available at www.rhnet.org under Student & Family Services, Health Services, and in the main office or health office of each school.

Too Sick for School?

A student should stay home from school if he or she:

- has a fever of 100° F or more.
- had a fever above 100° F in the last 24 hours.
- has vomited in the last 24 hours.
- has had diarrhea in the last 24 hours.
- has a runny nose that requires a great deal of management time.
- has a persistent cough that interferes with concentration.
- is too tired to engage in usual activities.
- has a significantly decreased appetite.
- has one or both eyes that are red, watery, or draining.
- has been on medication for an infection for fewer than 24 hours.
- has severe headache, especially when accompanied by fever.
- has severe sore throat accompanied by fever, malaise and/or red spots in the mouth.
- has a rash that is in various stages.
- has an unidentified rash in between the fingers.

Generally, after the above listed symptoms disappear, students require an additional 24-72 hours to recover. If you are in doubt about whether or not to send your child to school during or following an illness, please call the school health office for advice. If your child has a persistent cough, rash, fever, bump, or other bothersome symptom, you should contact your child's pediatrician.

Concussion Management

A collaborative approach between the student's physician, school health office, school counselors, academic and physical education teachers and district nurse practitioner is used to transition students who experienced head trauma back into full academics and activity. Concussion management protocols are available on the district website, www.rhnet.org, under Athletics.

Sports Physicals

Sports physicals are required yearly for each athlete. It is recommended that these exams be completed by your primary care physician. An exam is valid for one year through the month given (e.g. April 1, 2025, exams are good through April 30, 2026). You may complete sports clearance online starting 30 days prior to the start of each season by visiting www.rhnet.org/clearance.

School Buildings and Grounds Use



Reserving School Buildings & Grounds

Rush-Henrietta schools, athletic fields, and grounds are available to district-based non-profit groups for meetings and special events under rules established by the NYS Education Department and the Board of Education. All requests for use of school space must be submitted online. A minimum of two weeks notice is required to permit the processing of requests. Visit www.rhnet.org/reserve for information regarding required documentation and a link to submit the request.

Guidelines for Use

School buildings, fields, and grounds are off limits to unauthorized persons from 15 minutes after sunset to 15 minutes after sunrise. When on school grounds:

- All directions from school staff must be followed.
- No improper conduct or creating a public disturbance of any kind.
- Obey speed limits and parking regulations. Park only in designated lots.
- Snowmobiles, motor scooters, motorbikes, dirt bikes, ATVs, model airplanes, and drones are prohibited.
- The possession of alcoholic beverages, marijuana, illegal drugs, firearms, and weapons are always prohibited. Individuals violating the rules will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.
- Tobacco smoking and the use of e-cigarettes are not permitted at any time.
- Unauthorized pets are prohibited on school property during school hours.
 All pets on school property must be leashed and up-to-date on vaccinations.
 Clean up after your pet(s) and do not walk pets on or near playgrounds, tennis courts, athletic fields, or buildings.

When not in use by district programs, outdoor facilities - including playgrounds, fields, and tracks – may be available for casual use following the above guidelines. Please note: security cameras are used in and around district buildings and grounds.

Enforcing Parking Regulations on School Property

The district continues to experience a number of illegally parked vehicles in fire lanes and other areas immediately adjacent to and around our schools and other district buildings.

It is mandatory for all vehicles to park in appropriate and designated parking spaces on school property. The only exceptions to this are police and emergency vehicles, school transportation vehicles, school service vehicles, and school events for which special parking arrangements are directed and overseen by district and school security personnel.

In compliance with New York State Uniform Fire Codes, individuals are required to park in appropriately signed parking areas. Violations will be referred to the town code enforcement officials or police officials for issuance of a court appearance ticket.

Thank you for your compliance in this matter, which ensures the safety and security of students, staff, and community groups using district buildings and grounds.

Universal Pre-K (UPK) is a free, New York state-funded program for children who are 4 years of age by December 1, and are residents of the Rush-Henrietta Central School District. Community Programs



Continuing Education

The Rush-Henrietta Continuing Education Program includes offerings in personal and professional skill development, fine arts, crafts, physical fitness, and safe driving. New courses are added regularly based on interest. The program year is divided into four sessions; fall, winter, spring, and summer. A Continuing Education brochure describing courses, fees, and registration procedures is mailed to all district homes and available each session on the district website to view or print at www.rhnet.org/brochures. Driver Education

Driver Education is a joint partnership between the New York State Education Department and the Department of Motor Vehicles. This course is intended to educate students on appropriate driving skills and habits as well as playing a responsible role in the highway transportation/safety system. This fee-based program is open to any student 16 years or older who is enrolled in high school at the time of registration, and holds a valid NYS Learner's Permit. A fall, winter/spring, and two summer programs are offered each year. Please call 359-7805 for more information.

Even Start

For more than 30 years, Rush-Henrietta has offered the Even Start program. The only program of its kind in Monroe County, this fee-based multi-cultural family literacy program offers developmentally appropriate curriculum and a quality preschool experience for children ages 3 to 5.

District Learn-to-Swim Program

Rush-Henrietta Community Programs offers the American Red Cross Learn-to-Swim program during the school year and through the summer. Community Pool Use

The high school pool can be scheduled for use by Rush-Henrietta school groups and approved Rush-Henrietta community-based organizations. To be approved, your organization must provide the required paperwork [proof of 501(c)(3), appropriate liability insurance, and a list of organization members with addresses]. For a fee schedule, available dates, and appropriate paperwork, contact the Continuing Education office at 359-7805.

Pool Schedule During School Year

The pool schedule changes throughout the school year. District residents may access the pool for a variety of programs. See the descriptions above for the American Red Cross Learn-to-Swim program and community use. Family Open Swims may be available, when the pool schedule allows, on weekends and during school recesses. When open swim is available, the cost is \$5 per person. For pool rules, available dates, and up-to-date information, call the Continuing Education office at 359-7805.

Cub Care Zone



The Cub Care Zone is a fee-based childcare program for Rush-Henrietta students in grades K-6.

• Before- and after-school care:

The Cub Care Zone provides fee-based care for children in grades PreK-6 in the morning, the afternoon, or both. Students attend care at their regular school building. Children must be registered for a minimum of three days per week. Care will be provided on all school days. The program is open 6:30 a.m. until school starts, and again from the end of the school day until 6 p.m.

• Non-school day care, including summer care:

When school is not in session, all-day care may be provided, for an additional cost, from 6:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Good Shepherd building, 3288 East Henrietta Road. Visit the district website for the list of dates when non-school day care is provided. There will be no care available for districtwide emergency closings.

• As-needed care:

For your convenience, care will be available before and after school for occasional, unexpected personal needs. To be eligible for this fee-based, as-needed program, you must register for the Cub Care Zone and submit the enrollment forms prior to your child attending.

Transportation



Transportation Procedures

The transportation department strives to promote safe, effective, and efficient transportation services for all Rush-Henrietta students. Listed below are some general guidelines that will aid in this endeavor.

Enhanced Transportation Services

Elementary school students (K-6) who reside more than one tenth (.1) of a mile from school are eligible for district bus transportation services.

Transportation Guidelines

The Board of Education has adopted the following guidelines for students, parents, and bus drivers. These are intended to reduce the length of delay and congestion for the general motoring public.

- Students are expected to be at their assigned bus stop **five minutes prior to their scheduled pick-up time.** Students should wait in a location on a sidewalk or safely away from the edge of the roadway. Students are to be in plain view of the bus driver as the bus approaches the bus stop. The driver will stop and open the door. **If the bus driver does not see the student(s), he/she will immediately continue on the route.**
- It is expected that students make a reasonable effort to quickly board the bus (e.g., no sauntering). If a student repeatedly delays the bus, the bus driver will give the student a warning and notify the transportation office upon return to the garage. If this behavior continues, the bus will no longer wait for the student.
- If a student misses the bus to school, the district shall not alter any bus route to pick up the pupil; it will then be the responsibility of the parent/guardian to provide transportation

to school. The district may pick up the pupil on another bus route provided there is no route alteration necessary (the students may need to travel to another location for pick up).

- If a student misses the bus going home, the student may take the next scheduled bus ("late bus") if available; otherwise, it shall be the responsibility of the parent/ guardian to pick up the pupil. The school will notify the parent/guardian of the student's situation and location.
- For K-3 students, if an adult or responsible sibling is not visible to the driver at drop-off, the child will be transported to the Good Shepherd building, 3288 East Henrietta Road. For students in grades 4-6, parents may request that their child not be dropped off without an adult present, and the same rule will apply. This service will cost \$25 for the first occurrence, \$40 on the second occurrence, and \$50 for the third occurrence. After three occurrences in a school year, you will be required to find adequate child care. Cub Care is an option. This payment is due on arrival and may be paid with cash or credit card. Care at Good Shepherd closes at 5 p.m. and children must be picked up by then.

This information is a summary of Board of Education Policy 8411 and 8411-R. Complete copies of these and all other board policies are available in the district clerk's office and on the district website, www.rhnet.org/policies.

Private, Parochial, and Charter School Transportation

All transportation applications for private, parochial, and charter schools must be received by **April 1.** Applications for transportation received after the April 1 deadline will be subject to existing bus routes and capacity limitations. Requests must be renewed each year by April 1. Transportation is provided pursuant to New York State law.

Annual Request for Transportation to Babysitter or Childcare

In accordance with Board of Education Policy 8411 and Regulation 8411-R, parents or guardians of students living in the Rush-Henrietta Central School District who wish to have their child/children picked up or discharged at a childcare location must file a written request on the appropriate form annually by **April 1.** This request is to be filed at the school in which the child/children attend. **The request must be renewed each subsequent year by April 1.**

Please note, state law prohibits school districts from transporting students between home and a day care, Students can only be transported between school and home, or school and a day care.

Parents/guardians must have a consistent, five-day-a-week schedule for their child's bussing, with a maximum of two pick-up and two drop-off points during the week. For example, a child may go to day care Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and home the other two days. This form must be completed and submitted to the school office before service can be provided.

Applications for transportation received after April 1 for day care providers outside of the student's home school attendance area will be subject to existing bus routes and bus capacity limitations.

Student Bus Stop Change Requests

Bus schedules will be printed on or before August 20. Any requests for changes to a bus stop received after August 20 may not be processed until the Monday following the first day of school. For the remainder of the school year, requests for changes to a bus stop must be submitted, in writing, to the student's school no later than the Wednesday prior to the week of the requested change.

Parent Involvement



When parents attend school-related programs and activities on a regular basis, children experience greater success. Remind


Rush-Henrietta uses Remind as the districtwide classroom communication tool. Remind makes it easy to stay involved with your child's school experience. The district subscribes to the service; there is no cost to the users. It allows participating teachers, coaches, and club advisors to send messages and updates directly to your phone or electronic device. The safety of our students and employees is important to us, as is protecting the private personal data of our students, parents, and employees. When students and employees communicate electronically with one another, this should only be done using district email, Google Classroom, or Remind.

E-News and Calls

Rush-Henrietta communicates information to families quickly and effectively through email and phone calls. This system allows us to send important district information, like calls regarding snow days, important reminders, or other vital information, to more than one contact per student. Also, there is no need to sign up for E-News! Parents with email addresses on record in SchoolTool will automatically receive the E-News updates from their child's principal! These tools allow you to stay up-to-speed on all key information coming from your child's school and the district. Please be sure to provide updated phone and email contacts on your child's blue card. If these change during the school year, please notify the main office of your child's school.

Website

Located at www.rhnet.org, the district website is a wealth of information! You can find districtwide and school-specific information, breakfast and lunch menus, calendars, a staff directory, and more. News items are posted to the district and school pages regularly. In the event of an emergency or adverse weather conditions, an alert will be posted on the main page to keep you informed. To make the site as accessible to as many Rush-Henrietta residents as possible, a click of the Translate button in the upper right corner allows the visitor to view the website in their preferred language. And stay tuned for a NEW website being introduced in August with greater mobile functionality and a streamlined interface!

Thanks to the federal Community Eligibility Provision, ALL students in grades K-12 may again receive free meals for the 2025-26 school year. All students are eligible for free breakfast and lunch each school day, regardless of need. Snacks are not included, but are available for purchase.

Should I Still Submit an Income-Based Form?

Yes! Although the application is no longer required, if you meet income eligibility guidelines, you are encouraged to still submit a form. Not only is much of the state aid our district receives based on the percent of students with these forms on file, but there are direct benefits to you:

• A form must be on file in order to qualify for fee waivers for AP exams, college applications, instrument rental, etc.

Free School Meals for Grades K-12!

• The Summer EBT benefit was provided to families with these forms on file. Without a form on file, any future benefits may be impacted.

Students who would normally qualify for free and reduced price meals will need to complete a new form. Download the form at www.rhnet.org/mealapplication. It will take 10 days to process and approve once it is received in our office. Last year's application will expire on October 3, 2025. We do not accept faxed forms. Our convenient prepayment option allows you to prepay for snacks by giving the cashier cash or a check (\$5 minimum), or by paying with Visa or MasterCard credit or debit - by calling 866-727-3053 or by visiting www.mypaymentsplus.com. MyPaymentsPlus charges a transaction fee for prepayments of less than \$100 per family.
