No matter what you do or where you go in life, being flexible and keeping your options open can lead to greater opportunities for success. The same holds true when choosing an Air Force career.

When you enlist through the Guaranteed Aptitude Index (GAI) program you keep your options open by agreeing to accept a job in one of four aptitude areas: Mechanical, Administrative, General and Electronic. Your personal interests, Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) scores and physical results help determine what aptitude area is best suited for you.

## APTITUDE AREA ADVANTAGE

You may have uncertainties about enlisting in a guaranteed aptitude area vs. enlisting through the guaranteed training enlistment program (GTEP); however, the job you want may only be available through the GAI.

## JOB SELECTION

It's important to take your high school and college transcripts to BMT. If you have any vocational certificates, letters of recommendation and licenses (including your driver's license), take them along too.

During your second week of BMT you'll meet one-on-one with a career guidance specialist, who will give you a list of available jobs, also known as Air Force Specialty Codes (AFSCs), in your guaranteed aptitude area. You'll be able to select up to 12 AFSCs that you qualify for. The career guidance specialist will also answer any questions you have or address any concerns pertaining to the career field preferences you have listed.

The Air Force matches your ASVAB scores and other qualification factors to jobs that will be available the week you graduate from BMT. The list changes from week to week. The higher your ASVAB score, the better your chances of getting the job you want. You'll learn what job you get in your seventh week of BMT.

Not everyone will get his or her first choice. For example, if there is only one opening in a particular job that appears on your list and 20 Airmen are applying for it, chances are you would not get that particular job. However three out of four Airmen generally get one of their top choices.
