VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES:

ARC of Monroe County MyTime Providers, (formerly Special Sitters.)

My Time Providers are students at least 14 years old who will receive special training as an In-home care provider to families with a child who is developmentally disabled. Working as a My Time Provider is an excellent career exploration opportunity for students interested in special education, medicine, health, or therapy. It's also a chance to earn money while gaining valuable experience in human services. Interested students will receive 20 hours of free training, including First Aid, CPR, care providing, and instruction in the special sensitivities required to handle the disabled child and his or her family. After training, the qualified provider meets with families to arrange dates and payment for sitting. If you have questions or would like to hear more about the program, call Laura Jane Truesdell, coordinator of the ARC My Time Providers Program, at 271-0660, ext. 1352. The free training sessions are offered at various times during the year and pre-registration is required.

CP Rochester

Important Information for Seniors

Remember to schedule your senior appointment with your counselor. <u>This meeting is required regardless of your post-secondary plans</u>. Stop in to the Counseling Center Reception Desk to make an appointment with any of the secretaries.

- ✓ Be sure you've submitted your electronic application using either the Common Application or a specific college application.
- ✓ If you've applied using a paper application, be sure to submit all required paperwork along with the green sheet to Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Center.
- ✓ Be sure to submit a completed green sheet (transcript request form) to Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Center for each college you've applied to.
- ✓ List all colleges you've applied to in your Naviance Family Connection account under 'Colleges I'm Applying to.'

College Acceptance:

- ✓ When you receive an acceptance from a college or you know which college you will be attending, be sure to fill out a yellow slip in the Counseling Office and give it to Mrs. Leatzaw. One pennant will be put on display in the Cafeteria for each college a senior is accepted to.
- ✓ If you earned scholarship(s), fill out a yellow slip with scholarship name and total amount you will be receiving, or email her at lleatzaw@rhnet.org.
- ✓ If you applied to any colleges that require mid-year grades, see Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Office for a blue request form.

After You Receive Your Admission Decisions:

- ✓ You must notify each college or university that accepts you whether you are accepting or rejecting its offer. You should make these notifications as soon as you have made a final decision as to the college you wish to attend, but no later than May 1. It is understood that May 1 will be the postmark date.
- ✓ You may confirm your intention to enroll and, if required, submit a deposit to only <u>one</u> college or university. The exception to this arises if you are put on a wait list by a college or university and are later admitted to that institution. You may accept the offer and send a deposit. However, you must immediately notify a college or university at which you previously indicated your intention to enroll.
- ✓ If you are accepted under an early decision plan, you must promptly withdraw the applications submitted to other colleges and universities and make no additional applications. If you are an early decision candidate and are seeking financial aid, you need not withdraw other applications until you have received notification about financial aid from the admitting early decision institution.

Free Application for Federal Student Aid

An Overview of the FAFSA and the Application Process

There's a lot of federal money available to help you pay for school, but you can't be considered for any of it until you complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (the FAFSA). You should be able to fill it out on the Web or pick one up at your high school guidance office, public library, local college, or the U.S. Department of Education. The FAFSA is a first step in determining what financial aid award you might receive.

The online FAFSA is a great option

The fastest way to apply for federal student aid is over the Internet using the interactive FAFSA application on the Web at www.fafsa.ed.gov. This site hosts the online financial aid application, as well as an abundance of information about filling it out. You can look up the codes of the schools you're interested in, find out what information you need to gather, and sign up for a PIN number that serves as your electronic signature on the application. (If you're not applying as an independent student, you and one of your parents must apply for the PIN.)

This financial aid application is not too complicated

As long as none of the schools on your list require the CSS PROFILE, the application process is pretty simple. All you need to do is complete the FAFSA as soon as possible after January 1 of the year you plan to enroll and before any school-imposed deadlines, which are often in February or March. Keep in mind that you can't submit your application for the year you plan to attend prior to January of that same year. The process is easier if you have all your financial records from the previous year available, but if you don't, it's entirely OK to use estimated figures. There are a number of items you should gather before filling out the FAFSA. If you don't have all of these things available, use estimates. You'll need to submit changes later when the documents become available, but making changes is an easy process, so don't let that deter you.

Depending on your circumstances, you will need:

- Your Social Security number
- Your driver's license, if you have one
- Your W-2 Forms and other records of money earned in the previous year
- Your (and your spouse's, if you are married) previous year's Federal Income Tax Return: IRS Forms 1040, 1040A, 1040EZ, 1040 Telefile, foreign tax return, or tax return for Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Marshall Islands, or the Federated States of Micronesia
- Your parents' previous year's Federal Income Tax Return, if you're a dependent
- Your previous year's records of untaxed income, including Social Security, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, welfare, and/or veterans benefits records
- Your bank statements from the previous year
- Your business and investment mortgage information; business and farm records; and stock, bond, and other investment records from the previous year
- Your alien registration card, if you are not a U.S. citizen

The FAFSA application results in your Student Aid Report


After your FAFSA application is reviewed, you'll receive a Student Aid Report (SAR), the next step toward receiving financial aid. The SAR includes all of the information you reported on your FAFSA and shows your Expected Family Contribution, or EFC. The EFC is a result of a calculation by the federal government that is used to measure your family's financial strength and its eligibility to receive need-based aid. The formula is often referred to as the "needs analysis" because of this. The EFC is not the amount you owe the school per se, but a measure of where you stand relative to the entire nation. It is used to determine the types and amount of aid you are eligible to receive.

If you provided an e-mail address, the SAR will be sent to you electronically. If not, you'll receive a paper copy in the mail. Review it and check to see if the information you reported is accurately reflected on the SAR. If you used estimated numbers to complete the FAFSA financial aid application, you may have to resubmit the SAR with corrections. The schools you designated on the FAFSA will receive the information you reported and use it to determine your financial aid award. In many instances, one or more school may request copies of your and/or your parents' federal income tax returns or other documents to verify the information you reported. Submit any additional documents requested as soon as you can so your financial aid decision isn't delayed. The longer you wait, the greater the chance that less aid will be available to assign to you.

TAP Award Estimator

Student Financial Status Page

Please Note: These pages are not an application for TAP and they only produce estimated awards. Please consult with your Financial Aid officer for TAP information specific to the student. The estimated award is only for full-time undergraduate study at one college or school.

To be eligible for TAP, a student must:

- Be a United States citizen or eligible noncitizen.
- Be a resident of New York.
- Study full-time undergraduate (at least 12 credits per semester) at an approved postsecondary institution in New York.
- Have graduated from high school in the United States, earned a high school equivalency diploma through Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC) formally known as GED, or passed a federally approved "Ability to Benefit" test as defined by the Commissioner of the State Education Department.
- Be matriculated in an approved program of study and be in good academic standing. Have at least a cumulative "C" average as of the 4th semester payment.
- Be charged at least \$200 tuition per year.
- Not be in default on any state or federal student loans and not be in default on any repayment of State awards.
- Meet income requirement.

* The TAP Estimator is a tool to illustrate the current formula for TAP awards. It is not a predictor of your individual award and you should not rely on the Estimator in making your individual financial decisions. The Estimator functions based on the current TAP formula in law. It is subject to change.

Why does a college degree cost so much?

In February 1970, with the school's storied quadrangle by the Charles River still in the grip of winter, Harvard University broke the bad news to students and their parents: Tuition was going up.

Their reluctant consensus raised the annual cost of attending the prestigious school in the fall of 1971 by \$200— to \$2,600. It was the first time since 1949 that the school, which was chartered in 1650, had boosted tuition two years in a row.

"It used to be that once in an undergraduate career tuition would increase," acting dean John T. Dunlop told The Crimson, the student newspaper. "But from now on, unless inflation is halted, there's no choice in the matter but to continue raising tuition."

More than forty years later, tuition at American colleges and universities continues to surge ahead—much faster than the inflation Dunlop cited. This fall, Harvard's annual tuition and fees (not including room and board) will set you back \$45,278, more than 17 times the 1971-72 cost. If annual increases had simply tracked the inflation rate since 1971, next year's tuition would be to just \$15,189.

It's not just the tuition costs at elite universities like Harvard that are outpacing the government's Consumer Price Index. The average cost of tuition and fees at a private, non-profit, four-year university this school year was \$31,231—up sharply from \$1,832 in 1971-1972 (in current dollars). At public, four-year schools, tuition and fees cost about \$9,139 this year. In the 1971 school year, they added up to less than \$500 in current dollars, according to the College Board.

"If you look at the long-term trend, [college tuition] has been rising almost six percent above the rate of inflation," said Ray Franke, a professor of education at the University of Massachusetts, Boston. "That's brought immense pressure from the media and general public, asking whether college is still worth it."


Despite the annual sticker shock, millions of American students and their families still believe it is—and many experts concur, pointing out that college graduates, on average, do still make considerably more than those with just a high school diploma. Since 1971, annual college enrollment has more than doubled in the U.S. to 19.5 million, as of 2013, the latest Census data available. In that year, there were 5.3 million in two-year colleges, 10.5 million in four-year colleges and 3.7 million in graduate school.

But after decades of expanding enrollments, applications have begun tapering off. College enrollment peaked in 2011. With millions of recent debt-burdened college graduates still underemployed by one of the worst recessions on record, many students and their families are wondering why tuition keeps rising, and how much higher it will go.

Meanwhile, the ongoing rise in costs have stretched families' capacity to pay for college to nearly the breaking point. In 1971, for example, Harvard's \$2,600 tuition amounted to about 13 weeks' worth of the median household's annual income of \$10,285. Today, the median household needs to work for almost a year to pay the full sticker price. To make up the gap, millions of students and families every year are forced deeper into debt to make up the difference—around \$100 billion a year is borrowed through a cottage industry of private and publicly-funded loan programs.

With the total level of student debt outstanding at more than \$1.2 trillion, parents, students and researchers are now asking: how is this sustainable? And why does college cost so much?
