During the month of March R-H School Counselors will be...

Junior counselors begin group meetings with juniors in English classes regarding post-high school planning, including the timeline, researching careers and colleges, interest inventories, and other components of the Naviance Family Connection program. Parents are encouraged to log on to Naviance Family Connection (www.rhnet.org/navianceshs) to see the progress their children are making. Contact your child's counselor if you need further assistance.

Sophomore and junior counselors will be making changes to student course requests based on responses to the post card that was mailed home. They are also meeting with students regarding course progress, graduation requirements and June testing requirements.

In early April, **sophomore and junior** counselors will be meeting with individual students regarding courses that have been cancelled or have reached capacity. Students will be contacted if they need to make an alternate course selection. Juniors should review scholarship opportunities in Naviance.

Senior counselors are busy processing scholarship applications. They are continuing to meet with students who are in jeopardy of not graduating, creating plans to help students improve their academics to meet graduation requirements for June, or making alternative plans for a later graduation date.

Seniors - Make sure you apply for scholarships NOW! Many local scholarships have upcoming deadlines. The local scholarships are for R-H seniors only, so all applicants have an excellent chance of winning! Check The Counseling Connection, Naviance Family Connection or the College & Career Center Web site for scholarships! Reminder: be sure to notify Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Center if you have been awarded a scholarship.

Please continue to access SchoolTool for information regarding your child's progress. This information can be a great conversation starter with your child. If you have any questions, please reach out to your child's teacher or counselor.



Important Information for Seniors:





- ✓ Be sure you've submitted your electronic application using either the Common Application or a specific college application.
- ✓ If you've applied using a paper application, be sure to submit all required paperwork along with the green sheet to Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Center.
- ✓ Be sure to submit a completed green sheet (transcript request form) to Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Center for each college you've applied to.
- ✓ List all colleges you've applied to in your Naviance Family Connection account under 'Colleges I'm Applying to.'

College Acceptance:

- ✓ When you receive an acceptance from a college or you know which college you will be attending, be sure to fill out a yellow slip in the Counseling Office and give it to Mrs. Leatzaw. One pennant will be put on display in the Cafeteria for each college a senior is accepted to.
- ✓ If you earned scholarship(s), fill out a yellow slip with scholarship name and total amount you will be receiving, or email her at lleatzaw@rhnet.org.
- ✓ If you applied to any colleges that require mid-year grades, see Mrs. Leatzaw in the Counseling Office for a blue request form.

After You Receive Your Admission Decisions:

- ✓ You must notify each college or university that accepts you whether you are accepting or rejecting its offer. You should make these notifications as soon as you have made a final decision as to the college you wish to attend, but no later than May 1. It is understood that May 1 will be the postmark date.
- ✓ You may confirm your intention to enroll and, if required, submit a deposit to only <u>one</u> college or university. The exception to this arises if you are put on a wait list by a college or university and are later admitted to that institution. You may accept the offer and send a deposit. However, you must immediately notify a college or university at which you previously indicated your intention to enroll.
- ✓ If you are accepted under an early decision plan, you must promptly withdraw the applications submitted to other colleges and universities and make no additional applications. If you are an early decision candidate and are seeking financial aid, you need not withdraw other applications until you have received notification about financial aid from the admitting early decision institution.





Tips for Avoiding Senioritis

The symptoms show up every year. High school seniors try to balance extracurricular activities, a social life, college admission and perhaps a part-time job. Somewhere along the way, home work begins to seem less important and spending time with friends becomes the top priority. Then, they get accepted to college, and after that, high school seems even less important. School work begins to slide, and so do their grades. The diagnosis? Senioritis.

Senioritis can be defined as a "sickness" that strikes high school seniors. Symptoms include: laziness, an over-excessive wearing of track pants, old athletic shirts, sweatpants, athletic shorts, and sweatshirts. Also features a lack of studying, repeated absences, and a generally dismissive attitude. The only known cure is a phenomenon known as graduation. Senioritis is easy to catch and hard to get rid of. It can also be dangerous to your plans for the future. Every year, colleges take back their offers of admission, put students on academic probation, or change financial aid packages because of it. For example, Wilkes University (PA) gives merit-based financial aid based in part on class rank. "Four [students] this year were awarded one merit level based on their class rank at the point of application, but [their] final transcripts showed that their class rank had fallen to such a level that they no longer qualified for the original merit level," says the dean of enrollment services at Wilkes. "The damage ranged from \$1,000 per year to over \$3,000 per year in merit aid." A less obvious consequence of slacking off senior year is the lack of being prepared for the challenges of college. Freshman year can be tough, even for students who kept up with their course work throughout high school. Imagine entering college with rusty study skills?

"The habits one forms early in life are often carried over into later stages of life, be it college or the professional world," says the dean. "Motivation and hard work will always win out over basic intelligence."

Regardless of the consequences, it is still tempting to let school work slide. After all, seniors are busy people. To help you fight that temptation, read on for some ways to avoid senioritis.

Plan ahead. You probably already know what activities you'll stay involved in this year. And you know that college applications are coming up fast. Plus, you want to make the most of your time with friends and family. Fitting all of it in without pulling your hair out (or pulling your grades down) is the goal. The best tool is a calendar or day planner. Write down all of your deadlines, for applications, papers, tests and so on. Then note your other activities, your sports schedule, drama or band rehearsals, SAT or ACT day, or college visits.

Then, map out what you have to do. To complete that English paper, when should you begin working on it? If the big game is the night before the due date, plan to finish the paper a few days ahead of time. You won't have time to get it done the night before because you'll be leading the team to victory!

Don't obsess. It's easy to get caught up in the college admission process and forget about the here and now. "Don't spend the whole senior year obsessing about college admission," says the director of admission at Oberlin College (OH). "Going about the business of being a good student and good citizen, making choices for the betterment of your brain, body and spirit, often offers more benefit for college admission than some plan crafted to impress college admission officers." So don't get involved in some activity just to impress colleges. You don't have time for that. Instead, do the things you love, and drop activities that you're just not that committed to. (That doesn't include academics, though!)

Talk about it. Senior year can be sad and exhilarating at the same time. You and your friends catalog all the "lasts"—the last first day of school, the last football game, the last prom. But you're also looking forward to graduating and starting college.

"Remember in The Wizard of Oz when Scarecrow said 'part of me is over there and part of me is over here'?" says a representative from Westmont College (CA). "That's how seniors feel."

She advises seniors to talk about their feelings—which can range from fear of leaving high school to stress about college admission to anticipation of the new experiences college will bring. Useful people to talk to are your friends (who are going through the same things you are), your parents, your guidance counselor and other adults whom you respect.

Have fun. "I always encourage seniors to celebrate their senior year," says the representative from Westmont. "They have worked a long time to get to this point and should do all they can to enjoy it."

College Decision-Making Guide – How to Choose Which Offer to Accept

Once you get your college acceptances, congratulate yourself! You're on the road to getting a college degree. Some students receive admission offers from a few colleges. If you have more than one to choose from, here are some tips to help you make up your mind.

Identify Your Priorities

Do some soul-searching to figure out which of the colleges that accepted you is the best fit for you. Which one offers the educational and social experiences you are seeking?

Think about:

- Location: Does the college have an urban, suburban or rural campus? How far is it from home?
- **Size:** How big is the student population? What about class size?
- **Mix of students:** Is the college coed? Are there students from all over the country, with different backgrounds and experiences?
- Academics: Does the college offer programs of study that truly interest you?
- Extracurriculars: Does the college have the types and ranges of extracurricular activities that you want to participate in?
- Facilities: Will you have access to labs, computing centers, and music, theater or athletic facilities? Rank these characteristics in order of importance to you and see how each college comes out.

Compare Colleges

Use <u>College Search</u> at <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> to compare up to three of your colleges side by side. This tool lets you see differences — from distance to cost — at a glance.

Get Advice from People You Trust

Choosing a college is up to you — it's ultimately a personal decision. Still, it never hurts to ask for advice from people who know you well and care about your future.

- Talk to your parents: They probably know you better than anyone. Take advantage of their insight.
- Consult your advisers: Ask your teachers, mentors, coaches and family friends about their college experiences. Find out what they liked best and least about their college years you might gain a new perspective on what to expect.
- Ask your counselor: Your counselor knows what makes a good fit between a student and a college, and has experience helping students with these decisions.

Talk to People at the College

Get first-hand knowledge about what it's really like to attend a particular college from current students and other people on campus. Don't be afraid to ask direct questions — your future college will be home, school and work to you for the next several years.

- Your counselor may be able to put you in touch with former high school students who are now attending your colleges.
- College admissions officers can also give you contact information for current students, advisers and professors.



Visit Campuses

Campus visits can help break a deadlock if you can't decide between two or more colleges. If you've already visited the colleges, review your notes; if you haven't, consider visiting. Try to picture yourself on the campus. Think about whether or not you will be happy there; don't be afraid to trust your instincts.

Compare Your Financial Aid Awards

If you receive offers of financial aid from more than one college, use the College Board's <u>Compare Your Aid Awards</u> tool to compare up to four colleges, side by side. Enter some basic data and get these results for each college:



Total amount of aid awarded

Family share of costs

Type of aid — percentage of gift aid (grants and scholarships) vs. self-help aid (work-study and loans)

Family Financing Discussions

Ask your family if there are financial or other circumstances that may affect your decision, and whether you or your family might have to make sacrifices depending on your choice. Decisions about financial aid, such as whether you should take a student loan or work-study job, should be made as a family.

Consider Your Decision Carefully

Many colleges expect your final decision by May 1, so you have about a month to make up your mind. Don't be tempted to make a quick decision; think carefully about which is the best fit for you and your needs.

Decide and Reply

Once you've made a decision, send in your acceptance letter. Be sure to write to the other colleges that offered you admission, too. Send a brief note thanking them for their consideration, but declining their offer — this frees up places for other students.

Feel Good About Your Decision

This may be the first adult decision you make. Get advice and support from your family, but remember that you are capable of making this decision.

Don't feel pressured to find that one perfect college. Many colleges may fit the bill. The right college is one at which you will be happy and be prepared for a lifetime of learning and success.

What to Do if You're Wait-Listed - Boost Your Chances of Getting In



Colleges may put you on a waiting list if you meet the admissions requirements, but they've already accepted the maximum number of applicants. You'll be offered a place only if space becomes available.

If you get a waiting-list notice, decide whether you really want to attend the school before you agree to remain on the list. If you're eventually accepted, you often get only a few days to decide. Also investigate the conditions attached to being wait-listed; you may lose priority housing or financial aid options.

Take Control

It's not just a passive waiting game. There are things you can do to boost your chances of being accepted.

• Get a better sense of your chances of admission.

Colleges sometimes rank waiting lists. The higher you rank on the list the better your chances of being accepted. Contact the admissions office to find out if it ranks wait-listed students or if it has a priority list. Most admissions officers are willing to tell you your status.

• Write a letter to the admissions office.

Being wait-listed means the school has already determined you have the academic credentials; so nonacademic factors are more likely to sway admissions officials. Offer achievements that you may not have mentioned in your application and send new supplemental information. For example, maybe a terrific recommendation just came in. Emphasize your strong desire to attend the college and make a case for why you're a good fit. You can indicate that if accepted you'll enroll, but such a promise should be made only if you're absolutely certain. You can also enlist the help of an alumnus and your high school counselor.

• Study hard.

This is no time to slack off. If you're wait-listed, you may be reevaluated based on your third- and fourth-quarter grades.

• Stay involved.

Show admissions officers you're committed to sports, clubs, and other activities.

• Request another (or a first) interview.

An interview can give you a personal contact—someone who can check on the status of your application.

• Realize that you've already achieved something.

You were wait-listed, not turned away. Many students were not as successful.

Reconsider the colleges that accepted you.

If you'll be just as happy at one of your second choices, send in that deposit and plan to attend there. You'll be surprised how much better you feel after the decision has been made.

Colleges don't decide who will be admitted off the waiting list until the May 1 decision deadline has passed. Prepare to attend another school by filling out the paperwork and sending in a deposit. If you're accepted off the waiting list, you will forfeit your deposit at the first school and be required to submit a deposit to the second.

Should You Guess on the PSAT, SAT, or ACT?

Guess what? It's OK to guess on the PSAT, SAT, or ACT.



If you've ever taken a standardized test, be it the SAT, ACT or PSAT, you've probably encountered some questions that you weren't certain how to answer. When that situation arises you have three potential courses of action: panic, leave it blank, or guess. What should you do to maximize your score? You guessed it.

The "guessing penalty" that may have plagued your older siblings or parents is now a thing of the past; neither the ACT, SAT *or* PSAT deducts points for wrong answers. That means you literally have nothing to lose by bubbling in an answer for every question!

Guessing on the ACT, SAT, or PSAT does two things: it increases your odds of getting a correct answer, and it makes strategic use of your time by letting you focus your energy (and precious seconds!) on questions that you *know* how to do.

That said, there are ways to guess strategically. To help you make the most out of your guesses, consider these Test Day tips:

Answer every question on the ACT, SAT or PSAT. There is no longer a penalty for guessing on college exams. What this means is that you get a point for a right answer and zero points for either an omitted question or a wrong answer. So why would you ever omit an answer to a question? You shouldn't.

Use the "letter of the day" strategy. Before entering the test, choose one letter you will consistently choose for every guess you make. Maybe your letter is "A for Awesome!" or "D for Done!" It doesn't matter which letter you choose because they are all equally likely to be correct. What does matter is that you are consistent, as you increase your odds of randomly guessing a correct answer if you bubble in the same letter every time. Believe it or not, this will save you a lot of time!

Guess if a question becomes time consuming or confusing. There are numerous questions on the ACT, SAT or PSAT that you *will* be able to answer, so make sure you give yourself time to work on those. If you feel like you are spending an inordinate amount of time on any one question, it's time to guess and move on. While this may seem like you are giving up at first, what you're really doing is being strategic. You can always return to those later. Strategic test-takers know to spend their time on questions they are likely to answer correctly, not to stubbornly work through a difficult or time-consuming question before other, potentially easier, questions have yet to be worked on.

Eliminate obviously wrong answers whenever possible. In some cases, you can eliminate answer choices with very little effort. For instance, if a math question asks for the solution for *x* and tells you that *x* must be greater than zero, eliminate all negative answer choices.

Guess a simple integer for grid-in questions on SAT and PSAT Math. Sure, the odds of guessing the answer to a grid-in have dropped from ¹/₄ on a multiple choice question to approximately 1/14,000, but that's still greater than zero. Bubble in whatever answer you've calculated for the grid-ins you've worked on and for those you haven't, bubble in your favorite integer, like 1 or 2, in the last few seconds of the section once you've ensured that all multiple choice questions have been filled in. What do you have to lose?

FINANCIAL AID/SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION:

A school aid offer (or award letter) tells you what financial aid you can receive at a particular college or career school.

If you've applied to several schools, be sure to compare aid offers to see which school will be the most affordable.

If you listed a school on your *Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®*) and have been offered admission by that school, the *financial aid office* at the school will send you an aid offer (often electronically). The offer includes the types and amounts of financial aid you may receive from federal, state, private, and school sources. This combination of aid is your *financial aid package*. Because your financial aid package is created for you and is based on the cost of attending a particular school, your aid amounts will vary from school to school.

Figuring Out Net Price

Follow these easy steps to figure out your net price, or net cost, for each school, and find out which school will be most affordable for you: First, find the cost of attendance for your program on the aid offer. If the school doesn't list the cost of attendance on the aid offer, ask the financial aid office for this figure. Make sure it includes amounts you will pay to the school directly (such as tuition and fees) as well as other costs (such as living expenses, books and supplies, and transportation). Next, subtract the *grant* and *scholarship* amounts on your aid offer from the cost of attendance amount. Also subtract any savings you have available to put toward your school costs for the school year. The remaining amount is your net or out-of-pocket cost.

Compare the net costs for the schools you are considering. The net cost is the amount you will have to pay out of your pocket, using earnings from work or loan funds that you borrow. Also, because your aid offer might include student loans, it's important for you to compare the amount of debt you would be taking on at the schools you are considering.

If you find that you'll need to take out a larger amount in private loans at one school than at another, you should pay special attention to the terms and conditions of the private loans so you understand what your obligations would be. Read about <u>federal versus private loans</u>. If you have any questions or don't understand what's in your aid offer, contact the school. For instance, it's important to know which items in the offer are grants and which are loans. You also need to think about <u>which aid to accept</u>.

Glossary

FAFSA

Free Application for Federal Student Aid

Financial Aid Office

The office at a college or career school that is responsible for preparing and communicating information on financial aid. This office helps students apply for and receive student loans, grants, sc...

Financial Aid Package

The total amount of financial aid (federal and nonfederal) a student is offered by a college or career school. The school's financial aid staff combines various forms of aid into a "package" to...

Net Price

An estimate of the actual cost that a student and his family need to pay in a given year to cover education expenses for the student to attend a particular school.

<u>Grant</u>

Financial aid, often based on financial need, that does not need to be repaid (unless, for example, you withdraw from school and owe a refund).

Scholarship

Money awarded to students based on academic or other achievements to help pay for education expenses. Scholarships generally do not have to be repaid.

Financial Aid Appeal Letter Sample

Q: Can I appeal my financial aid award? My parents have been laid off and I now need much more financial aid to stay in college.

A: If your ability to contribute to your education costs has drastically changed this year, you CAN and SHOULD appeal to your financial aid office for more financial aid. By appealing your financial aid award, some students are able to secure thousands of dollars in additional grants and student loans.

If you plan to appeal your financial aid award, contact your financial aid office as soon as possible. Students who appeal earlier in the year are more likely to get it. Also, juniors and seniors who are approaching graduation might get preference over freshmen.

Below you will find a Financial Aid Appeal letter sample:

My current grade point average is ENTER GPA, and I plan to do even better this academic period.
