
Congratulations Class of 2001!


Best wishes to the Class of 2001! Commencement was held on June 22, 2001 in the Blue Cross Arena of the Rochester War Memorial. Some of the 317 graduates are pictured here. Many of the graduates received awards, commendations and scholarships for their outstanding achievements during their high school careers, and 86 of the graduates were members of the National Honor Society.

Among those who received diplomas this year was George Rossiter, a veteran of World War II who joined the Army after Pearl Harbor was bombed. Veterans across the country who could not complete high school were awarded honorary diplomas as part of the government's Operation Recognition program. The Class of 2001 Valedictorian was Kyra Tichacek and the Co-Salutatorians were Tooba Fayyaz and Marianne Stott.









Board of Education to Move Transportation Center Proposal Forward

This fall, the Rush-Henrietta Board of Education will move forward with its plans to present for voter approval a proposition for a new Rush-Henrietta Central School District Transportation Center.

The special vote is scheduled for Wednesday, October 10, 2001 from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. in the Dee Strickland Conference Room of the Ninth Grade Academy, located at 2000 Lehigh Station Road.

At its January 22, 2001 meeting, the Board of Education unanimously decided to bring to public vote a proposition that would authorize the acquisition of land located at the corner of Middle and Lehigh Station Roads for the purpose of constructing a 35,000 square foot transportation center at a total cost not to exceed \$9.5 million. The cost includes the acquisition of 56.7 acres; site development; sewer implementation; required permits and easements;

general construction; architect, engineering, insurance and legal fees; and equipment costs.

The Board's decision to bring this project to a public vote was based upon an assumption that current building aid (53.1%) would be available. After building aid, the total net cost to District taxpayers would not exceed \$4.4 million. This translates to an estimated average cost of approximately \$1 per month for a primary residence with a full value of \$100,000 under the STAR program.

The Board of Education had planned to present this proposition to voters along with the annual school budget this past May. However, based upon the fact that the state budget had not been approved, there was uncertainty about state aid revenue for this project and a decision was made to postpone the vote until a later date. Although the state budget remains stalled in the

legislative process in Albany, current information and advice from area legislators, financial advisors and educational organizations closely following the budget debate have given the District assurance that legislators are not likely to change the building aid formula for this type of project next year. Additionally, further information from Albany suggests that state aid for noninstructional building projects, such as this transportation center project, may be eliminated or significantly reduced in two to three years.

The Board of Education has scheduled a Community Forum on the proposed District Transportation Center for Tuesday, September 25, 2001 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. District residents are invited to attend the forum that will be held in the Dee Strickland Conference Room of the Ninth Grade Academy, located at 2000 Lehigh Station Road.

Kyra K. Tichacek Named Presidential Scholar



Kyra K. Tichacek. Class of 2001, has been named a Presidential Scholar. Kyra is one of only three students in New York State and 141

students nationwide who were so named. Selection was made by a 32member Commission on Presidential Scholars and is based on academic achievement, essays, self-assessments, activities, school recommendations and school transcripts. The Presidential Scholars Program was established

in 1964 by Executive Order of the President.

During her senior year, Kyra took Advanced Placement (AP) Economics, AP Chemistry, AP Calculus, AP American Government, Spanish V Honors and electives in Sociology and Yearbook. In previous years, she completed AP English Language, AP Physics, AP History and AP English Literature. The Class of 2001 Valedictorian, Kyra is not only an outstanding student, but she has excelled in soccer, has been a community volunteer and has held part-time and summer jobs. Over the years, she has earned over 50 awards in academic subjects, writing, art and athletics.

Kyra and the other winners attended the awards ceremony and other activities during several days at the end of June. Among the

activities were a visit to the White House and a recognition ceremony at which she received a Presidential Scholar medallion. In applying for the program, Kyra named James DeCamp, her 10th grade English teacher, as the teacher who most influenced her. He was also invited to attend the activities in Washington.

In addition to this honor, Kyra won a National Merit Scholarship from the Xerox Foundation renewable for up to four years of college undergraduate study. Kyra will attend Cornell University this fall, where she plans to major in industrial and labor relations. She hopes to eventually earn a law degree.

Community Forum on Understanding Tax Rates Scheduled

At its June 26, 2001 meeting, the Rush-Henrietta Board of Education voted unanimously to host a Community Forum on Tuesday, August 14, 2001 to share information regarding the process for establishing the school tax rates, including the impact of equalization rates and property assessments.

Typically, school tax rates are very close to the tax rates projected at the time the school budget is voted on. However, at the time of the school budget vote, school tax rates are estimates only. Three important pieces of information must be known with certainty to establish school tax rates: state aid, equalization rates and property assessments. Each of these factors is estimated at the time of the school budget vote. If the school district's estimates are accurate, the school tax rate estimate is also accurate. However, if any of these three factors differs significantly from the school district's estimate, actual tax rates will be higher or lower than tax rates projected at the time of the school budget vote.

At the June 26 Board of Education meeting, Debbie Rogowicz, Executive **Director of Financial Operations for** the District, presented to the Board the most recent information available to

school district officials on state aid, equalization rates and property assessments. Additionally, the school board was shown the impact that this information would have on tax rates when the Board sets the school tax rate in August. Board members discussed, at length, the possibility that they would be required by state law to set a school tax rate in August without certain information about state aid. State aid will remain uncertain until the state budget is adopted.

Recognizing that community residents may wish to know more about how the Board establishes school tax rates, the Board of Education will host a Community Forum on August 14, 2001 to share information regarding this. District residents are encouraged to attend this important forum scheduled from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. preceding the regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting. The Board will vote on school tax rates for the 2001-2002 school year at a later

Voters Approve Budget and Elect Three Board Members

Voters in the Rush-Henrietta Central School District approved the 2001-2002 budget of \$78 million on May 15, 2001 by a vote of 1,652 to 794. Voters also approved expenditures from two Reserve Funds: a \$1.5 million appropriation from the Capital Reserve Fund for improvements throughout the District (1,697 to 583) and the expenditure of \$800,000 from the School Bus Replacement Reserve Fund (1,693 to 594). The Reserve Fund

propositions do not impact the budget or tax rate.

Three members were reelected to the Board of Education: Susan M. Derrick, with 1911 votes; David R. Pennella, with 1,754 votes; and A. Dirk Hightower, with 1,611 votes. Bernie Fallon and Mohammad Nasar received 837 and 568 votes respectively.

At the July 10 organizational meeting of the Board, David R. Pennella was reelected President, and


