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Participation in Annual Partnership Survey Increases

Parent involvement in the education of all children continues to be an important goal of the Rush-Henrietta Central School District. When parents, teachers

and students work as partners in education, learning environments are created that have a positive impact on student success.

To measure the effectiveness of parent partnership practices in Rush-Henrietta, parents are asked to complete and return a Partnership Schools Survey each year. The survey asks parents to indicate their level of satisfaction with various parent involvement practices at District schools and to offer suggestions about steps that schools could be taking to improve involvement. It includes 50 questions that are broken into five main cate-

gories including parenting education, communications, volunteering, learning at home and decision-making. The results indicate the strengths and weaknesses of the District and are used to implement practices that will improve parent participation to better support student success.

To build effective parent partnerships, schools and teachers must develop effective practices at each grade level. While some practices work well at one

grade level, those practices might not work as well at other levels. In an effort to provide schools with better feedback about current parent involvement practices, efforts were made in the 2001-2002 school year to increase the number of parents returning the survey. At the

recommendation of the District Parent Advisory Council [DPAC], the 2002 survey was sent under separate cover to all parents. As a result, the number of

responses increased dramatically with the return of 1,866 surveys. In most areas, the 2002 results indicated an overall increase in parent satisfaction.

The District invited parent representation from shared decision-making teams, DPAC and school parent groups from each of its nine schools to attend Partnership Survey Forum on June 26, 2002. During the forum, parents and administrators reviewed the results of the 2002 survey. The group also discussed strengths, areas of concern, content of the survey and possible

improvement initiatives for the 2002-2003 school year. Those interested in reviewing the 2002 survey results may request a copy of the summary from the Office of the Superintendent of Schools by calling 359-5021.



Transportation/Operations Center Site Development is Under Way!

In October 2001, voters in the Rush-Henrietta Central School District approved the construction of a 35,000 square foot transportation and operations center, not to

exceed \$9.435 million, at the corner of Lehigh Station and Middle Roads. The construction of this modern and more centrally located facility will ensure the long-term capacity of the District to maintain the efficient delivery of quality services that support the advancement of education. It will also enable the effective utilization of resources and the efficient delivery of quality services that industry standards, as well as student and community requirements as they evolve and change over the next 25 to 30 years.

Site development began with the awarding of bids in early May, 2002. DiFiore Construction of Rochester, NY, was the successful low

bidder at \$1,912,636. Original estimates for site development work were \$2,221,230 making the start of this project well under budget. Development work on the site includes cleaning and clearing of the 20 acres designated for construction, recontouring the site, provisions for all

utilities, permits for and the construction of entrances from Middle and Lehigh Station Roads, preparation of the building pad, parking areas and internal roadways, as well

as construction of the required mitigation/retention pond consisting of three sediment pools designed to protect federal and state wetlands.

Site development is one of five primary contracts to be awarded for this project. Other contracts include general construction, plumbing, electrical and mechanical. Final State Education Department approval of the facility section of this project and the award of the remaining four bids is anticipated this summer. Timely site approval, along with favorable construction market conditions, explain why this project is, and is expected to remain, on schedule and under budget.

Construction is scheduled to be completed in

August of 2003 and the center will be fully operational for the opening of school that September. For additional information, residents are encouraged to call the Office of School Operations at 359-5018 or David Kaye, Project Manager, at 359-5387.

Community Education Opportunities

Each year the Rush-Henrietta Central School District offers a wide variety of educational programs and services to students, their families and community residents of all ages. To meet individual needs, District residents are encouraged to participate in age appropriate learning opportunities.

Continuing Education For Adults

The Rush-Henrietta Continuing Education Program includes offerings in computers, personal and professional skill development, fine arts, crafts and physical fitness. New courses are added regularly when sufficient interest is shown. The program year is divided into four sessions: fall, winter, spring and summer. A Continuing Education brochure describing courses, fees and registration procedures is mailed to District residents before the start of each session. Residents may register as soon as you receive the brochure. Please use the registration process outlined in the brochure. If you do not receive a brochure or if you would like further details, please call the Continuing Education Office at 359-7805 or e-mail your questions to RHCE@rhnet.org. Continuing Education Advisory Council

This council, which includes representatives from business, higher education and the adult education student body, advises the Continuing Education Coordinator on the development of adult education programs. If you are interested in serving on the council, please call 359-7805.

High School Equivalency Program

It's never too late to earn a high school diploma! The Family Services Program offers courses during the day and evening to prepare you to take the NYS high school equivalency exam, leading to a diploma. There is also a GED Home Study Program for those who can't attend classes. The program is free to District residents and non-residents. Call 359-7918.

Native American Cultural Center

The Native American Cultural Center, funded by a federal grant, provides after-school classes for Native American students, educational programs for our schools and evening family programs. For information, call 359-7947.

Literacy Services

Do you need help with English as a Second Language [ESL]? The Family Services Program offers ESL classes during the day and evening. There is also an ESL Home Study Program for those unable to attend classes, which is free to both District residents and non-residents. If you have questions about the District's literacy services, please call 359-7918.

Family Center

The Family Center is both a place and a program. Located in the Vollmer Building on Telephone Road, the Center is an educational and service center for families. Each month, the Family Center offers activities such as preschool story hours and family nights for parents and children. The Family Center also sponsors workshops and information nights for parents who want to learn more about being active partners in their children's education. Check the calendar and watch for special mailings about activities at the Family Center. You may also call 359-7915 or 359-7918 for more information.

School-Age Child Care Program

This program serves Rush-Henrietta students in grades K-6. Care is provided before and after school, on school vacation days and during the summer. This fee-based program is located at the Webster Building and at the Vollmer Building. Before school only care is provided at Crane Elementary School. For information, call 359-7911 or 359-7912.

Even Start Program

Even Start is a special literacy program for preschoolers and their parents. Families who qualify for the program are eligible for services for their preschoolers as well as literacy and job training for parents. To qualify, the preschooler must be between the ages of two and five, the family must reside in the Rush-Henrietta District, and the parent must lack a high school diploma, need further training for employment or need to improve English language skills. Use of District Facilities

District buildings and school grounds are available for community use as outlined below. When in, or on, school property, please observe the below guidelines for use.

School Buildings

Rush-Henrietta schools are available to community groups for meetings and special events under rules established by the State Education Department and the Board of Education. Applications for use of school space are available at each school. Completed forms need to be returned to the principal of the school you wish to use. Please give as much advance notice as possible to permit the scheduling of requests.

Athletic Fields

School athletic fields are in great demand. The District works with the Rush and Henrietta recreation commissions, the Rush-Henrietta Athletic Association and other community sports groups to schedule equitable use of fields. During the summer, town recreation commissions use school fields/facilities for playground programs and for town-sponsored recreational sports leagues.

The community is invited to use the outdoor track at the high school. The hours, weather permitting, are sunrise to dusk, Monday-Friday and weekends/holidays only if the high school is open.

Guidelines for Use

- When on school grounds, please obey speed limits and parking regulations.
- Park your car only in designated lots.
- Snowmobiles, motor scooters, motorbikes and model airplanes are prohibited.
- School buildings and grounds are off limits to unauthorized persons from 15 minutes after sunset to 15 minutes after sunrise.
- Alcoholic beverages, firearms and the possession of weapons are always illegal. Individuals violating the rules will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.
- Smoking is not permitted in any school building or on school grounds at any time.

District Pool Use Family Open Swim

The Senior High School pool is open to District residents for Family Open Swim according to the schedule to the right. For admittance to the pool:

- Infants through elementary school students must be accompanied by an adult and provide appropriate emergency information.
- Middle school students must be signed in and out by an adult, provide appropriate emergency information and leave an R-H Student ID.
- Ninth Grade Academy and high school students must sign in and out, provide appropriate emergency information and leave an R-H Student ID.
- Adults must provide appropriate emergency information.

Non-swimmers must be accompanied by an adult in the water. To be classified as a swimmer, one must be able to enter and exit the water without assistance, float on stomach and back without assistance and proceed across the width of the pool, using any form, without assistance. At any time, a lifeguard has the right to remove any participant who is deemed to be in an unsafe circumstance. Once admitted to the pool, all rules posted on the premises must be followed. Only Coast Guard approved floatation devices are allowed.

For a complete list of pool rules and updates to the Family Open Swim schedule, please contact the Continuing Education Office at 359-7805 or call the pool office at 359-5262. The Family Open Swim fee is \$1 per person, per hour.

District Learn to Swim Program

Community Pool Use

The pool can be scheduled by District residents for school and nonschool groups for a fee. Requests may be made through the Continuing Education Office and must be approved by the building principal. The Henrietta Commerce Network works to enhance business and the quality of life in the Henrietta area. Membership consists of professionals in the retailing, education, professional services, banking, corporate, high technology, health care and small business industries. The HCN provides networking activities, education programs and business support services for its members. In addition, this past school year, the HCN partnered with the District to launch the Teenage Employment Partnership, an initiative which emphasizes that a teenager's number one job is doing well in school while a student in Rush-Henrietta.

Notification of District Senior Citizen Benefit Change

At the June 11, 2002 meeting, the Rush-Henrietta Board of Education approved a new senior citizen benefit which will impact senior citizen pass eligibility and participation in certain District programs. Beginning January 2003, a Rush-Henrietta Central School District Senior Citizen Pass will be available only to District residents 65 years and older, and will entitle the holder to:

- reduction in tuition for many Continuing Education courses as specified in the Continuing Education brochures
- free admission to school events such as plays, concerts and sporting events
- free admission to scheduled open swims as specified in the Continuing Education brochures

Current passes will be accepted through December 2002. As of January 1, 2003, all previously-issued senior citizen passes will be obsolete. District senior citizens who wish to take advantage of the above-mentioned benefits need to obtain a new pass, which will be available this fall, at the reception desk located in the Parker Administration Building at 2034 Lehigh Station Road between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. To obtain a pass, proof of age and residency must be presented at the time of issue. Please note that senior citizens will now be required to present the new Senior Citizen Pass for entrance to events and to obtain a discount for Continuing Education courses.

Summer Hours for all Schools

For the convenience of parents and community residents, each of the District's nine

schools will be open to the public from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., including the lunch hours, Monday through Friday, during the summer months. If for some reason a building cannot be accessible to the public during these times, school office hours will be posted near the main entrance of the building. In this case, signs will be posted that designate when the office will reopen and who visitors should contact if they are unable to return at another time.
