Everyone says that sounds great, and I think it does too. But I can't help



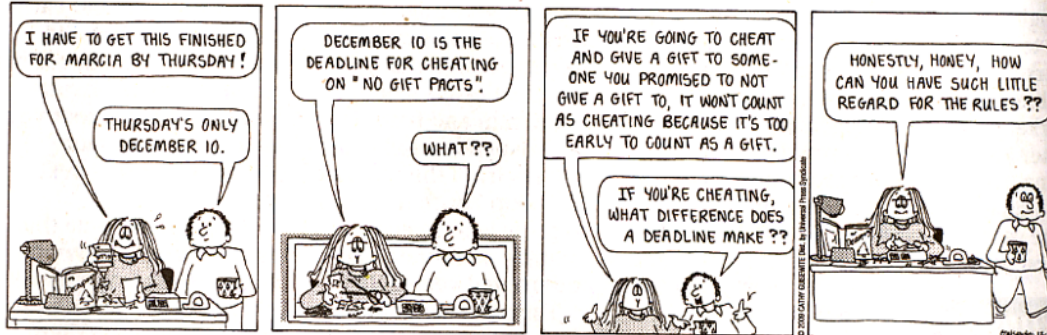
wondering: Is there going to be an official Winston family swimming stroke and an official Winston family ice cream sundae?

Senses

How does a robot sense the world around it? Most robots can "see" and "hear," and robots usually need a sense of touch. Very few robots have a sense of taste or of smell.

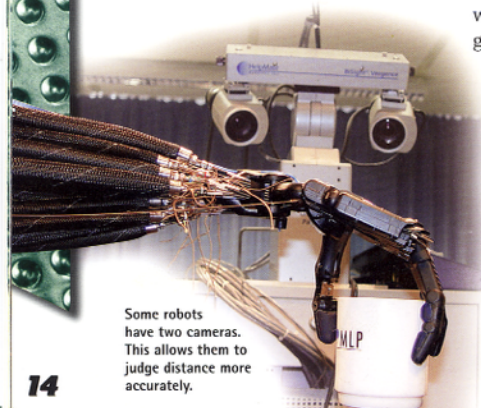
Sense of sight

Robot sight is quite different from human sight. Humans automatically recognize hundreds of items, such as chairs and tables. But for a robot, the world is a blur of colors and shapes.

Robots can be programmed to recognize certain objects. But the robot will not recognize anything that is new, or out of place.

Camera eyes

Many robots do not actually see. Their "eyes" are video cameras that send information back to a human controller. The controller watches where the robot is going and guides it.



Some robots have two cameras. This allows them to judge distance more accurately.

Many robots are fitted with **light sensors**. They can follow a line that is darker than the surrounding area, even though they can't actually see where they're going.

Sense of hearing

Robots detect sound in different ways. Some robots use **ultrasonic sensors** to detect objects. Others can "hear" a human voice. Advanced robots can understand human words and reply.

The small robots called SwarmBot cooperate in a swarm, like a group of ants. They detect each other using sound sensors.

Sonar

Bats and dolphins use **sonar** to find their way around. They send out high-pitched squeaks or clicks, and listen as the sound echoes back to them.

Many robots also use sonar like this. If the sound bounces back quickly, the robot knows there is something in the way. It can turn to avoid the obstacle.

Making conversation

There are no robots yet that are advanced enough to have a conversation with a human. However, some can react to a voice. Kismet, a **face-bot** developed at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, will turn to hear a voice. It also makes noises that sound like speech.

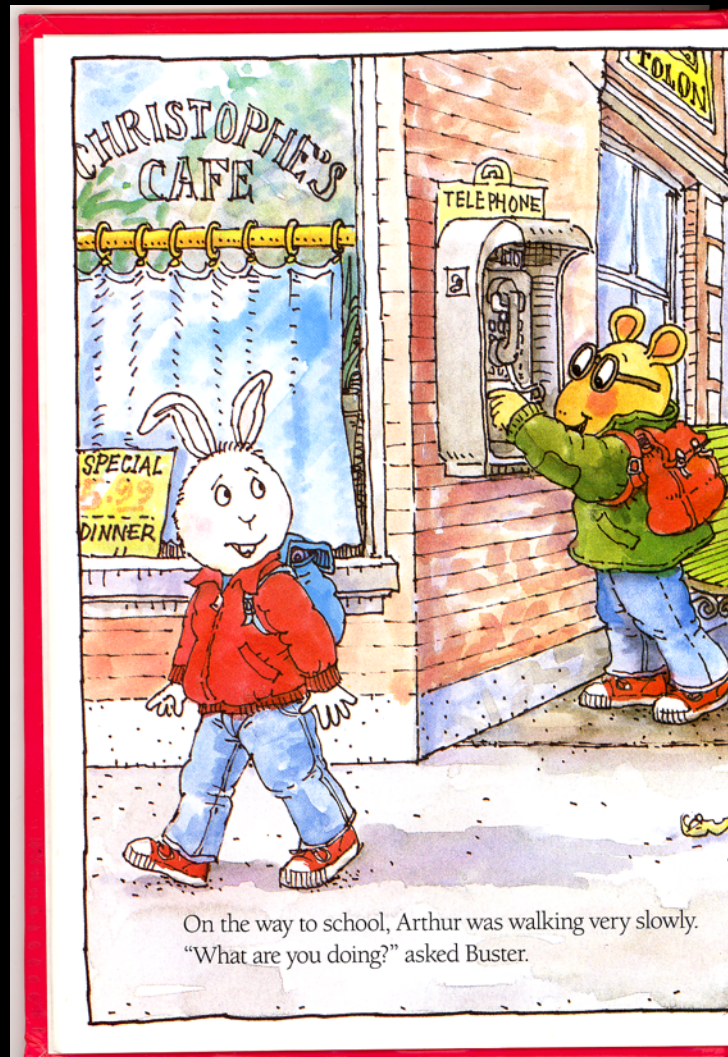


SwarmBot is a team of robots that use sound sensors to work together.
